CONCERT TRANSPORTATION AND RESERVATION

Bus transportation will be provided to and from the Library of Congress for the concert on Thursday evening. There will be no charge for either the concert or the buses, but places for both must be reserved in advance as indicated on the registration form.

CENTER LOCATION AND PARKING

The Center of Adult Education is located on the western edge of the College Park Campus at the intersection of Adelphi Road, University Blvd. (Md. Rte. 193), and Campus Drive. College Park and the eastern edge of the University Campus are on U. S. Rte. 1. Exit 27 South on the Capital Beltway (Interstate Rte. 495) provides easy access to U. S. Rte. 1 and University Blvd.

The airports which serve this area are listed in their order of convenience to the University:

Friendship, Baltimore: Contact the Airline Limousine dispatcher for direct transportation to the Center. Approximate cost is \$3.75 per person.

Washington National and Dulles International: Contact the Greyhound Airport Service Dispatcher for limousine service to the Sheraton-Silver Spring Motel, 8727 Colesville Rd., Silver Spring, Md. Limousine costs: \$2.50 per person from National; \$3.50 per person from Dulles. A direct phone line in the Motel lobby will obtain taxi service to the Center; cost is approximately \$3.00 per person.

Participants may use the *free parking lot* adjacent to the Center (enter the lot from Campus Drive or from the east-bound lane of University Blvd., Md. Rte. 193).
